LEGISLATIVE NEWS

I am not sure all of you follow the AAUW Wisconsin Facebook but they have asked members to contact your state legislators to object to the following three bills:

1. AB 388/SB 294, which dismantles the Government Accountability Board and replaces it with two partisan commissions. Why are you changing the GAB when all over the country it is touted as one of the few successful and clean systems? While no system is perfect, this is no way to correct the imperfections of our system. Equal number of Democrats and Republicans will only ensure deadlock.
2. AB 387/SB 292, which rewrite our campaign finance laws: it doubles campaign contribution limits to candidates, and it allows unlimited donations to political parties and party committees. It also allows unlimited dark money donations to so-called independent groups, which can coordinate with the candidates themselves. And it gets rid of the requirement that donors to candidates have to identify their employer. The latest national poll says that 84% of the American voters want less money in politics not more. Looking only at Republicans, it drops to 80%. Clearly Wisconsin voters who have seen their medium income decline every year since

2008 are not asking to be able to give more to our candidates.

In addition, no longer major donors will no longer have to list their employer/occupation. If a particular industry (owners and lobbyists) up their contribution to a candidate, we will not know that the bill helping that industry might have been influenced by those donations.

Why only major donors? Small donations are not going to change policy. Big donations shape policy. If they did not the legislature would not be seeking to hide them.

3. AB 68/SB 43, which exempts politicians, and only politicians, from secret John Doe investigations. If prosecutors hadn't had this tool in 2001, the guilty politicians in the Caucus Scandal would have gotten off.
