Roe v. Wade Anniversary Marked by Multiple Bills, Rallies, Legislative Hijinks

"The national fight over abortion rights took center stage this week when House Republicans dropped plans to vote on a 20week abortion ban after two dozen Republican members, led by Rep. Renee Ellmers (R-NC) and other GOP women, voiced opposition to a provision requiring rape survivors to report the assault to law enforcement in order to access abortion after 20 weeks. The GOP women's willingness to so publicly buck their party leadership was unusual and welcome, especially this early in the new Congress. AAUW appreciates their leadership, though of course would rather have seen them oppose the entire bill, not just one piece of it. In the end, the House pivoted and passed a more far-reaching anti-choice bill that would restrict both public and private insurance policies from covering abortion, regardless of a woman's circumstances or needs. House leaders have also vowed to bring up the 20-week ban at a later time.

As all of this was taking place in the House, Senate Democrats introduced the Women's Health Protection Act, an AAUW-supported bill that would protect access to safe, legal reproductive health care so that women can make their own decisions with advice and support from those they trust the most. In other parts of Washington, D.C., that day, anti-choice supporters held their annual "March for Life," and AAUW attended a pro-choice rally at the Supreme Court to stand up for women's fundamental right to make important medical decisions without government interference."

Congress Continues to Focus on Education as Voucher Advocates Mark 'National School Choice Week'

"On Tuesday, the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions committee held its second hearing about the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), also known as No Child Left Behind (NCLB). The hearing focused on ways to evaluate teachers. For the second week in a row, AAUW Action Fund Lobby Corps volunteers advocated on Capitol Hill for AAUW's principles regarding ESEA reauthorization, this time on the House side. This week's focus on education coincided with National School Choice Week, which, despite the name, is truly a push for private school vouchers. AAUW opposes voucher schemes as they often involve federal funding for private and religious schools (a clear violation of separation of church and state), exclusion of students with disabilities, and discrimination based on gender, religion, ability, race, and income."
