Happy 90th Birthday, Green Bay Area Branch!

Things have changed since 12 women organized this branch on January 31, 1927, but its goals remain the same, namely: advancing equity for women and girls through quality education. So strongly did these early founders believe in education that at the Branch's second meeting, the first scholarship of \$50 was awarded to a graduate of Green Bay West High School. Our styles have changed. In the 1930s, members held teas for high school girls and their mothers to "acquaint them with positive points of views of college education." More recently, the Branch supported the Sex Equity Task Force that became the impetus for Green Bay Schools to implement Title IX fostering equal education for boys and girls. Although not our only project, scholarships remain our major emphasis. Over the years, thousands of dollars of scholarships have been awarded. Presently, the Branch awards scholarships to women over 25 years old, junior or senior, earning their first baccalaureate or finishing their associate degree at Bellin College, College of the Menominee, NWTC, St. Norbert College or UWGB Green Bay. We also continue to annually support the AAUW Education Foundation Program. We published the book, Women of Northeastern Wisconsin Dreamers and Doers, highlighting area women who made significant contributions to this area. This was followed by an annual Dreamers and Doers awards luncheon. Presently we are preparing the sequel that will include, among others, these nominees and award winners – ensuring "herstory" remains a part of history.

<u>February Branch Meeting on the Immigration Story</u>

A special thank you to Stella Frigo for coordinating February's branch meeting with speakers, Elizabeth Kostichka and Sr. Melanie Maczka from Casa ALBA, a local Hispanic resource center. I loved hearing Elizabeth's immigration story. She reminded me that, unlike what the media wants us to think, each person's immigration story is unique. Elizabeth's began with a chance meeting in a line at Disney World! She is a lovely talented woman who spoke passionately of her life and the difficulties in bridging the cultures. I can only imagine the feelings she had leaving the large cosmopolitan Mexico City (as well as her family and culture) for Green Bay. She arrived in March and thought all the trees were dead, because they had no leaves on them. Clearly adapting to our climate was only one of her many challenges. (At least my Swedish relatives were familiar with the climate.) I so appreciated the open and honest discussion of the problems facing the Hispanic community today.

Elizabeth never had to worry about being undocumented, but she is very sensitive to the concerns of this part of our community. The fear created by the administration's efforts to criminalize all of the Hispanic community is alive and well in Green Bay. This fear is very close to me, though my Mexican American daughter was born in Green Bay. I know from personal experience that these are hardworking people with families who have lived and contributed to this community for years. It includes adults, brought as children to this country, who have no memories of Mexico. Deportation has and will divide families and cause harsh disruptions in our schools and workplaces. As the administration shows more and more of what its immigration policy is really going to be, let us remember the real people that governmental policy is impacting. I was hearten to read that Green

Bay's police chief was one of many law enforcement leaders asking Congress not to make them enforce immigration laws. These officers have fears, too. They know that without community cooperation their jobs become nearly impossible. One cannot investigate crimes if no one will talk to you. Like the Disney line, perhaps we can use the grocery or other line to keep lines of communication open. A smile or casual conversation might be enough to let people know we welcome them to our community.

On a positive note, we were invited to share a lunch with members of Casa Alba, perhaps when our Birthday Party and State Convention are over. Also, thank you to all the members who brought donations for the Casa Alba preschool program. Thank you too to Sue for the delicious Chili and to all who brought fruit, veggies and desserts.

Equal Pay Day

April 4, 2017 is Equal Pay Day. This is the symbolic day when women's pay from the past 15 months catches up to what their male equivalents earned in the past year. It's a day to raise awareness about the gender pay gap.

The gender pay gap is one of the main issues AAUW focuses on. They began their initiative in 1922 when the AAUW Legislative program called for a reclassification of the U.S. Civil Service and repeal of salary restrictions in the Women's Bureau. In 1955 AAUW supported an equal pay for equal work bill and in 1963 were instrumental in getting Congress to pass the Equal Pay Act. However, as we all know, the disparity continues.



Human Trafficking Study Group

The latest issue of Outlook has an article about Human Trafficking, highlighting that this is one of the Association's areas of interest. Locally, Liz Pierce has been spearheading our Branch's efforts. Presently Linda Birder, Dotty Juengst and Sara Ramaker are working with Liz. The topic is huge and the needs are great. New Branch Program Model considered
