



significant civil rights victories in our nation's






Wednesday, August 15 5:30 pm

NATIONAL AAUW NEWS

PLEASE CARE ENOUGH TO VOTE BY JUNE 9 ON CHANGES TO BYLAW- IT IS IMPORTANT- IT IS EASY

The three proposed changes to our national by-laws. Two relate to changes to the board of directors. They are consistent with what many nonprofits are adopting. Specifically, to stagger terms and make them three (not 2) years long. The other is to allow up to 5 board members to be nonmembers. They feel they can recruit specific skills better. Of course, they will be encouraged to join. They seem reasonable to me. We need to do what makes it easier for national to recruit new board members.

The third proposal is very dear to my heart. This is to remove all academic requirements for membership. I agree that "there is a big disconnect between our mission to advance equity for women and a degree requirement that is a barrier to our membership." It is seen as discriminatory and wrong and hurts membership recruitment and fund raising. Our mission is to break down barriers and yet AAUW creates this barrier to membership. It hurts us in recruiting new members, too.

Nationally, organizations do not want to give to an organization that discriminates. It is time to change. We need to embrace all women.

For the voting to have any effect, 5 % or our membership must vote. National states: "The 2017 election was a great success, with 11.49 percent of our members voting — more than double the 5 percent quorum required by our bylaws." Really? That is pitiful for an activist group. Let us work for 100%. It is easy. If you have email access. You have gotten a notice from AAUW to vote. Open the email, hit the link, and you are immediately taken to the voting site. If you know how you are going to vote, you hit yes or no three times and you are done. It really is that simple, that quick, that easy. For those of you without email, ask me or another member to help you. We can find a convenient time. I won't watch how you vote just set it up for you. It is that easy. PLEASE VOTE!
