Participation in AAUW events can take one in new directions. Here is an example:

My summer has been filled and fun. My oldest grandson Gabriel has become enamored with fishing. Thanks to my involvement as President of AAUW Green Bay Branch I had the opportunity to learn about Brown County Isaac Walton League's Osprey Point. I had driven by it on Highway GV many times but did not know the wonderful opportunities it opens for all of us. I soon joined the Isaac Walton League. I have taken my grandsons to the Point to hike many times. (Earlier this summer, Kellen and I got to see the incredibly beautiful and very large Osprey father fly right over us as we were looking up at its nest.) Back to the fishing, I know nothing about fishing. John Birder was nice enough to help Gabriel set up his line and show him how to cast. Gabriel wants nothing more than to fish. My membership allows us to fish in the two catch and release ponds at Osprey Point. The ponds are stocked so there is always a hungry fish to catch. We have enjoyed many quiet afternoons fishing. Also, I took a stream monitoring class

offered by the Isaac Walton League. It was way out of my comfort zone. (I knew nothing of macro invertebrates!). I have passed the first test and I am half way on the road to being an official stream monitor. Passing all the tests, I will be able to monitor streams and send the data to the EPA. The great thing about it is that Wisconsin DNR has to accept the data. As very few streams are monitored by the DNR (or anyone), it is important that they have to accept our tests when they are making decisions about our waterways. I mention all of this as a reminder of all the unknown opportunities that involvement in AAUW opens for us every year. A year ago, I would have scoffed if anyone suggested I should fish! Now I am knee deep in the stream waters and sitting by the ponds fishing!

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# **AAUW's Position on Confirmation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh**

After careful consideration, AAUW opposes the confirmation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court. While recognizing Judge

Kavanaugh's experience, a review of his available record indicates that he holds positions that are fundamentally opposed to AAUW's mission. He has shown opposition to women's access to reproductive health and contraception and has called into question protections under the Affordable Care Act. His record indicates that he is willing to cause harm to women by upending employment and labor rights and restricting voting rights. AAUW urges all members to contact your senators to urge them to oppose Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation.
