This is a Queen Anne style Victorian mansion built in 1891 at the cost of \$35,000 to \$50,000. It was designed by the same Milwaukee architects who designed the Pabst Mansion in Milwaukee. The first table setting exhibit at the Rahr-West was introduced more than 30 years ago by Ruth West. The exhibit originally featured traditional table settings of fine china and crystal but has taken on a life of its own. It's not unusual to find tin plates or coconut shells in place of china or a picnic blanket instead of a table. (A hostess will be available to answer questions)

Here are the specifics on the three clothing options that will be available:

Fleece Vest - (Sizes- XS, S, M, L, XL, XXL,3XL,4XL; Colors – Light Royal, Black, Pearl Grey)

Polo Shirt (Sizes- XS, S, M, L, XL, XXL,3XL,4XL; Colors – Black,Forrest Green, Kelly Green, Maroon,Purple, White,True Royal,TrueNavy)

Vneck Tshirt (Sizes- XS, S, M, L, XL, XXL; Colors-Red,Asphalt,Black,Charcoal, Fireberry, Heather Grey, Navy, Mint, White)

The **Vneck** would run \$15.00 up to an xlarge; \$17.00 for 2xl

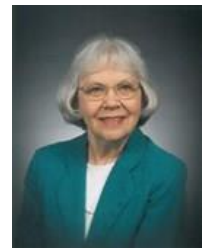
The vendor requires a minimum of 12 pieces for embroidery and for screen printing. It takes 7-10 business days after approval of art to have clothing delivered.

WHY I AM AN AAUW MEMBER

Originally, probably out of a sense of obligation or maybe just guilt I joined AAUW. It was 1950 and we had moved here from UW Madison when I got a call from the Green bay branch president Lorraine Evenson. She had been contacted by the Racine branch with my name as a prospective member. It turned out that my mother, with her long connection there suggested the idea. OMG!! How embarrassing was that?

Even though I had grown up with AAUW small group meetings at our house, especially the Child Study group, it never occurred to me to actually join, not then anyway. However the upshot was I did join and so have carried on a family tradition. In fact, we now have 4 generations of women in our family as AAUW members, including my granddaughter who is in our own branch.

Why have I stayed for 68 consecutive years in our branch? There have been many changes over time. We're smaller now. We don't have the 250 members we had when I was membership chair the first time – before women entered the work force following World War II, but that has its own advantages. Members no longer traditionally work their way up the ladder to the "top" by serving on numerous committees. Now we appreciate new members jumping right in to volunteer their time and talents in whatever appeals to them. Our size gives us a cohesiveness not possible in a larger

group. We get to know each other faster and better. Life-long friendships are forged through working together toward a worthwhile common goal and having fun along the way. We have evolved with the times!

Here is an advantage that younger women probably take for granted: In the “olden days” women were often identified by their husband’s careers or accomplishments, know under their husband’s name. For example: as late as 1971 our own directory listed me as Mrs. Robert Hitchcock. Unmarried women were of course “Miss”. With gradual progress – YAY – we finally made it to our own first names. We have our own identity. Dare we say we don’t care what husbands past, present, or ex or non-existent “do”? Here, we are interested in each other as individuals, each with our own accomplishments. And in a great leap forward now even allow men to join AAUW!

Here’s some advice: When you have the chance, attend a national convention. The collective education represented there under one roof is so impressive, you’ll never drop out. We are unique. We have an important history behind us and important goals ahead. We matter! Our branch itself is rife with stories – happy, sad, and inspiring. You can see the UWGB archives to get a sense of who we are and what we do and have done. So hang in there girls. In the twinkling of an eye you too can be a life member!
