White House, CDC feuding over study of toxic chemicals in drinking water

Kyle Bagenstose, USA Today, Nov. 30 - A multimillion-dollar federal study on toxic chemicals in drinking water across the country is facing delays because of a dispute within the Trump Administration, according to several people involved in the study or who have knowledge of the process.

The dispute has implications for more than half a dozen communities where drinking water has been heavily contaminated with per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). Concerns about the chemicals have exploded nationally in recent years, following decades of PFAS use in products including non-stick cookware, water-resistant clothing, food packaging, carpets and military firefighting foams. Scientists say significant delays could limit the effectiveness of the study.

The unregulated chemicals are known to exist at some level in the drinking water of tens of millions of Americans, with one estimate placing the number as high as 110 million. The chemicals are also the subject of "Dark Waters," a film released in November starring Mark Ruffalo and Anne Hathaway.

NEWS FROM AAUW WISCONSIN/NATIONAL

Neicy Thorson and I attended the district meeting several Saturdays ago and learned many new things to report to all of you. I love and hate the district meetings. I so admire the women who attend and learn so much from each of them and what their branches are doing. AAUW really is doing amazing things all over the state. These meetings are so inspiring! The "hate" part is that I learn about so

many wonderful things that have to be added to my "To Do" list. Here is a few of the things we learned.

1. <u>AAUW WISCONSIN STATE</u> CONVENTION:

This is Wisconsin's 100th state convention and is also the 100th anniversary for the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment giving women the right to vote. The theme is Reflect on the Past, Prepare for the Future." Please consider joining in the celebration at the State Convention in LaCrosse, WI April 17-18, 2020 (Note date has changed from previous announcement.)! I am planning on attending and would love to have company. It will be held at the Radisson Hotel, 200 Second Street S., Harborview Plaza in LaCrosse. Room rates are \$110 a night and the special rate is available three days prior and three days post. The hotel can be booked directly. 2. NCCWSL

This is the National Conference for College Student Leaders AAUW offers every year. College and post college graduates from across the country gather to talk about leadership issues. From what I have heard from attendees, this experience is transformative and inspirational. AAUW Wisconsin is offering three \$500 scholarships to attend. This covers the tuition, room and board. I very much want to nominate someone for this scholarship. But I could use a little help. I promise volunteering will not be a major commitment of time. Please let me know if you could work on this in January with me.

3. <u>AAUW REGIONAL CONVENTION JUNE</u> 18-20, 2020:

In lieu of a national convention, AAUW is opting for regional conventions. Our region's convention will be held in East Moline, Illinois, June 18-20.

The theme is Remembering the Past, Building the Future. It will be held at the Hyatt Place which is a new hotel overlooking the Mississippi River. Confirmed speakers are: Kim Churches, Kendra Davis, Lisa Maatz and Denise Lieberman. There will also be pre-convention activities planned for June 17. The location looks beautiful. 4. <u>UPDATE ON WORK SMART</u>: AAUW recently announced: "With a lot of help from members, AAUW hit a major milestone in our partnership with the Coca-Cola Foundation to teach women everywhere to negotiate effectively. As of August 23, we've trained 102,656 women to ask for the salary they deserve, either through <u>Work Smart Online</u> or inperson workshops. Coke has given AAUW the opportunity to apply for yet another \$500,000 grant for this initiative.

The goal of reaching 100,000 women through Work Smart in less than a year was ambitious. But our members delivered — To further expand the program, AAUW National is entering into strategic partnerships with women.nyc, Starbucks Global Academy, the city of Wichita, and many others, 500 professional organizations and state and local commissions have been engaged through our outreach.

I recently received a flyer from AAUW advertising the AAUW Work Smart Program. In it they included the story of one 26-year-old professional who used her training to land a job with a salary \$20,000 more than her initial offer. She felt the greatest strength of the program was to learn specific phrases and practice role playing so that she was comfortable using the words. She learned the delivery is just as important as the words.

When you are selling joining AAUW to your friends, it is good to remember that we are so much more than just our branch activities. AAUW really is changing the world – even if it is one job at a time.

AAUW Wisconsin has a group working to expand this program in Wisconsin.

5. <u>APPLICATIONS—21 Fellowships and Grants</u> **Now Open**

Do you know any women pursing postgraduate studies, furthering their careers or working on a program to benefit women and girls? Point them to <u>our fellowships and grants applications</u>.

Deadlines run from November to December.

6. AAUW's Public Policy Initiatives:

- 1. "To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women. This broad classification includes pay equity and fairness in benefits and compensation; access and advancement in employment; programs that provide women with education, training and support for success in the workforce; and strengthening retirement benefits programs such as Social Security.
- 2. "vigorous enforcement and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative Support a strong system of education". Adequate funding for public education, protection of programs that meet he needs of women and girls including SYEM and vigorous enforcement of Title Ix are. Priorities in this initiative.
- 3. "To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society." healthcare and family planning services. Including expansion of patient's rights; freedom from violence and fear of violence, including hate crimes in homes, schools, workplaces and communities, freedom in the definition of AAUW advocates for action, and expanding voting rights; increased access to quality, affordable family and self and passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.
