#### Presidents Message

Happy New Year!

New beginnings bring us a fresh start on new or recurrent resolutions and this year promises to bring us many opportunities! I won't address the ubiquitous ones we all dutifully put on the list every year but that we see fading by mid-February or March. This year I'll think a little more broadly in what I hope to accomplish and hope we can work on some as a group.

Resolution #1 – Read more. Not just the number of books or pages read, but I want to read more in terms of the scope of what I read. To read more in terms of scope often means broadening the range and depth of your reading to encompass a wider variety of topics, genres, authors, perspectives, or styles. Expanding scope can involve:

#### 1. Genres

 Exploring genres you don't usually read, such as historical fiction, memoirs, science fiction, or multicultural literature.

#### 2. Topics and Themes

 Delving into new subjects like philosophy, environmental issues, or social justice—connecting closely to your community work and interest in multicultural learning.

#### 3. Authors and Perspectives

 Seeking voices from different cultures, backgrounds, or viewpoints, such as LGBTQ+ authors, contemporary global writers, or classical works you might not have read before.

#### 4. Formats

 Adding diversity to the type of reading material—poetry, essays, graphic novels, or audiobooks can complement traditional novels.

#### 5. Contexts

 Understanding books in a broader context, such as the historical, cultural, or political settings that influence them.

You can use ChatGPT to curate a reading list for you and refine it as you go. If you haven't started using some of the AI tools out there, ChatGPT is a great way to start. My curated reading list included some familiar titles, such as Caste, Braiding Sweetgrass, and Pachinko and some new ones I've added to my 2025 reading list – The Ministry of Utmost Happiness, Hood Feminism, and Milk and Honey. Stretch yourself! Try reading a book that addresses something new to you or that stretches your thinking. Be bold in your choices!


The joint AAUW Green Bay Branch book clubs will welcome,

Lion's Mouth is offering a 5% discount on orders of a copy of "Waltraud" placed on their website. Indicate "AAUW" when ordering to receive the discount.


