AAUW Proposed Annual Dues Change & Rationale

The AAUW Board of Directors will consider an increase in AAUW individual member dues at their upcoming February 2025 meeting. The proposed increase is \$5 each year for the next 5 years, starting April 1, 2025.

The individual member dues rate is currently \$72. The proposed annual increase of \$5 would mean the following annual dues rates over the next 5 years:

<u>Date</u>	<u>Dues Rate</u>
April 1, 2025	\$77
April 1, 2026	\$82
April 1, 2027	\$87
April 1, 2028	\$92
April 1, 2029	\$97

Dues cover about 15% of AAUW's budget and do not cover the cost of member support. Consistently raising dues will cover more costs of member support and help offset increases in costs due to inflation. AAUW's costs rise each year, yet dues do not automatically increase without the board's directive. In keeping with AAUW's commitment to financial sustainability and the financial health of the national office, regular dues increases are necessary.

AAUW did not increase dues in FY 2025 and the board is now considering a 5-year plan to increase individual member dues at \$5 annually.

AAUW-WI Convention 2025 Highlights

The 104th Wisconsin State Convention will be held at the Stoney Creek Hotel La Crosse – Onalaska, April 25-26. Reduced guest room rates have been negotiated at \$104 plus tax (\$118.04 total) per night.

• Optional Tour

On Friday morning, an optional guided tour of Mary of the Angels Chapel at St. Rose Convent in La Crosse, founded by the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration in 1878, will be offered to those who arrive early. The church is Romanesque style, with Corinthian pillars and Bavarian stained glass windows. Altars are constructed of Italian marble inlaid with Venetian glass and mother of pearl mosaics. There is no charge for the tour.

Keynote Speakers

Keynote speaker Amanda Goodenough, an educator and consultant, works to elevate historically marginalized voices and advance racial justice. She is currently Lead Executive Officer and Founder of Goodenough Consulting, LLC.

Prior to assuming that position, she worked for 17 years as the Director of the Research and Resource Center for Campus Climate at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. Amanda serves on the boards of numerous organizations focused on justice, equity, decolonization, and interconnectedness. Her honors include the Social Justice Achievement Award for the YWCA Tribute to Outstanding Women (2010) and the La Crosse Area Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Award (2021). The title of Amanda's convention presentation is "Welcome to the Struggle . . ."

Lynda Drews of Green Bay is the author of *The Maid and the Socialite: The Brave Women Behind Green Bay's Scandalous Minahan Trials*. Her keynote, "Uncovering the Lost Histories of Women," will discuss the true story behind the book. The historical nonfiction, written in the victims' voices, discusses the truth about the women's abuser, a famous Green Bay surgeon. *Midwest Book Review says*, Lynda's book is "written with the drama of fiction and the compelling research of fact." She also wrote *Run at Destruction: A True Fatal Love Triangle* and *Circle of Innocence*. Lynda will have books available for signing.

• Concurrent Sessions

Concurrent sessions will feature topics such as the differently abled, artificial intelligence, big money and politics, the Holocaust, reproductive health, and local African American history.

• **Convention Activities**

Traditional convention activities, such as tri-board displays from each branch and a fundraising silent auction, will be included. Branches are encouraged to donate baskets for the auction. The Friday evening "Sweet Suite" will again be offered.



April 18, 1906: A massive earthquake rocks San Francisco just before daybreak, igniting a devouring inferno. Lives are lost, lives are shattered, but some rise from the ashes forever changed.

Sophie Whalen is a young Irish immigrant so desperate to get out of a New York tenement that she answers a mail-order bride ad and agrees to marry a man she knows nothing about. San Francisco widower Martin Hocking proves to be as aloof as he is mesmerizingly handsome. Sophie quickly develops deep affection for Kat, Martin's silent five-year-old daughter, but Martin's odd behavior leaves her with the uneasy feeling that something about her newfound situation isn't right. Then one early-spring evening, a stranger at the door sets in motion a transforming chain of events. Sophie discovers hidden ties to two other women. The first, pretty and pregnant, is standing on her doorstep. The second is hundreds of miles away in the American Southwest, grieving the loss of everything she once loved. The fates of these three women intertwine on the eve of the devastating earthquake, thrusting them onto a perilous journey that will test their resiliency and resolve and, ultimately, their belief that love can overcome fear. From the acclaimed author

of "The Last Year of the War" and "As Bright as Heaven" comes a gripping novel about the bonds of friendship and mother love, and the power of female solidarity.

"This is not a book about the politics of immigration. This book—at its core—is not about immigration at all. This book is about homelessness, not in a traditional sense, but in the unsettled, unmoored psychological state that undocumented immigrants like myself find ourselves in. This book is about lying and being forced to lie to get by; about passing as an American and as a contributing citizen; about families, keeping them together, and having to make new ones when you can't. This book is about constantly hiding from the government and, in the process, hiding from ourselves. This book is about what it means to not have a home.

After 25 years of living illegally in a country that does not consider me one of its own, this book is the closest thing I have to freedom."
