AAUW National office has begun to send out renewal notices, even for those whose membership is current to June 30, 2025 (which is those who pay through our branch by check). If you gave me your check last year, you may continue to do so and I will renew your membership for July 1, 2025- June 30, 2026. I will collect in May and June. AAUW now operates renewals on what they call a "rolling renewal". If you renew online by credit card, which is OK, your membership will be noted as starting when the payment is received and that will be your renewal date next year. A bit of History: Review of "A Visit with Will Dilg"

Women are behind so many wonderful things and they rarely get the credit. Here is one time they got the credit.

I was fortunate to attend the production of "A Visit with Will Dilg", a one-person show that introduces the audience to Will Dilg, the founder of the Izaak Walton League and the only reason the northern Mississippi is still a preserve. By 1920, much of the Mississippi River was drained for farm lands and that was clearly the plan for the northern Mississippi. Enter Will Dilg, an avid fisherman and Chicago businessman. In 1922, he organized the Izaak Walton League, a combination of hunters, fishermen and conservationists who wanted to preserve the natural environment. (The League is the oldest conservation organization.)

In 1923, the War Department issued a permit to drain the Winnishiek bottoms near Lansing, Iowa. Dilg knew it was not long before the entire river habitat would be lost to developers. Dilg proposed the federal government purchase the remaining stretch of the Upper Mississippi flood plain habitat and create a National Preserve. No one had ever heard of such a thing.

Recognizing the power of the newly granted women's vote, he convinced and joined with other organizations including the General Federation of Women's Clubs of America to shift public opinion and together they push through this legislation. In less than a year, Congress (by unanimous vote) did what had never been done before and designated an unprecedented 261 mile stretch of river lands as the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge – now 244,000 acres of protected wetlands extending from Reads Landing, Minnesota to Rock Island, Illinois. President Calvin Coolidge, an Izaak Walter League member, signed the bill in 1924.

The production is a combination of a film and "Will Dilg." The film contains historical pictures, but mostly photography of the beautiful area that has been preserved. The gentle background music is interspersed with the sounds of the preserve. Steven Markings who created the film and portrays Dilg is absolutely charming. The entire experience is a delight to the senses. What a wonderful way to learn about an important event in U. S. and Wisconsin history! I hope this program will be available again for all to see.

Looking to the next 100 years, managing the refuge will require a lot of planning and careful action. The river is changing and again needs public support and Congressional action. Congressional funding has not kept pace with inflation and does not take into consideration the changing river, invasive species and the stress that climate change has brought, for example. The National Wildlife Refuge System has lost 800 permanent jobs since 2011, a drop of 27%. Will Dilg's work is never ending.



Movie Updates

Of interest to women of our age could be the film <u>"The Substance"</u> starring Demi Moore. I saw it because of good reviews about Demi Moore's performance which I concur with. It deals with "ageism" in a very novel medical science fiction/drama/horror style. I found the first 2 hours very interesting and thought-provoking, but wish the last 20 minutes had been omitted due to its unmitigated goriness, so be fore-warned. Also if you have not seen <u>"Green and Gold"</u>, a locally filmed independent movie about a farm family struggling to hold on to their farm. I urge you to go while it is around in the Marcus theaters. Cost is \$14, no discounts. It is truly a G-rated, good family film with a subplot involving the Green Bay Packers' team of the Brett Favre era. 




Summary: Throughout her childhood, Safiya Sinclair's father, a volatile reggae musician and militant adherent to a strict sect of Rastafari, became obsessed with her purity, in particular, with the threat of what Rastas call Babylon, the immoral and corrupting influences of the Western world outside their home. He worried that womanhood would make Safiya and her sisters morally weak and impure, and believed a woman's highest virtue was her obedience. In an effort to keep Babylon outside the gate, he forbade almost everything. In place of pants, the women in her family were made to wear long skirts and dresses to cover their arms and legs, head wraps to cover their hair, no make-up, no jewelry, no opinions, no friends. Safiya's mother, while loyal to her father, nonetheless gave Safiya and her siblings the gift of books, including poetry, to which Safiya latched on for dear life. And as Safiya watched her mother struggle voicelessly for years under housework and the rigidity of her father's beliefs, she increasingly used her education as a sharp tool with which to find her voice and break free. Inevitably, with her rebellion comes clashes with her father, whose rage and paranoia explodes in increasing violence. As Safiya's voice grows, lyrically and poetically, a collision course is set between them. How to Say Babylon is Sinclair's reckoning with the culture that initially nourished but ultimately sought to silence her; it is her reckoning with patriarchy and tradition, and the legacy of colonialism in Jamaica.

OPTIONAL FRIDAY MORNING ACTIVITIES

9:00am – 10:00 am: You are invited to tour Mary of the Angels Chapel, a La Crosse historic landmark, located at the St. Rose Convent motherhouse for the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration (FSPA). FSPA is a religious order of women founded in 1863. The sisters started hospitals, educated teachers, and remain active in prayer, adoration and goodness for the world. The chapel is noted as one of the most authentic German Teutonic Romanesque buildings of the world with Corinthian pillars and Bavarian stained-glass windows. Altars are constructed of Italian marble inlaid with Venetian glass and mother of pearl mosaics. 11:00am – 12:00pm: Decoding the Driftless, a documentary film, to be shown at Stoney Creek Hotel. Join scientists and seasoned local guides on an adventure through the air, across rugged landscapes, on and under the water, through a secret underworld, and across time itself as they explore and decipher ancient clues of the archaeology, paleontology, geology, and biology of the Driftless Region. With its captivating scenic beauty, this exceptionally rare, scenic, and fascinating landscape known as the Driftless Area is the only "island driftless region" in the world.

• Keynote Speakers

- Keynote speaker Amanda Goodenough, an educator and consultant, works to elevate historically marginalized voices and advance racial justice. She is currently Lead Executive Officer and Founder of Goodenough Consulting, LLC. Prior to assuming that position, she worked for 17 years as the Director of the Research and Resource Center for Campus Climate at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. Amanda serves on the boards of numerous organizations focused on justice, equity, decolonization, and interconnectedness. Her honors include the Social Justice Achievement Award for the YWCA Tribute to Outstanding Women (2010) and the La Crosse Area Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Award (2021). The title of Amanda's convention presentation is "Welcome to the Struggle . . ."
- Lynda Drews of Green Bay is the author of "The Maid and the Socialite: The Brave Women Behind Green Bay's Scandalous Minahan Trials". Her keynote, "Uncovering the Lost Histories of Women," will discuss the true story behind the book. The historical nonfiction, written in the victims' voices, discusses the truth about the women's abuser, a famous Green Bay surgeon. *Midwest Book Review* says, Lynda's book is, "written with the drama of fiction and the compelling research of fact." She also

wrote "Run at Destruction: A True Fatal Love Triangle and Circle of Innocence". Lynda will have books available for signing

 A third keynote speaker has recently been announced: Meghan Kissell, Senior Director of Policy and Member Advocacy at AAUW National. Meghan's presentation is titled, "National AAUW Public Policy." Meghan has more than 20 years of nonprofit policy and issue developing and implementing targeted social impact strategies designed to engage key stakeholders and policy makers to advocate for positive policy outcomes. Prior to joining AAUW, Meghan led efforts to expand LGBTQ equality in the Deep South with the Human Rights Campaign. She also worked for the Conservation Lands Foundation, organizing local and national campaigns resulting in the successful protection of more than five million acres of public land. Immediately following Meghan's presentation Barbara Peterson, AAUW-WI Public Policy Co-Chair, will discuss public policy at the state level.

Concurrent sessions will feature topics such as the differently abled, artificial intelligence, big money and politics, the Holocaust, reproductive health, and local African American history.
